Dear Justice McGregor:

As the Court Automation Coordinating Committee moves forward in the process of evaluating new case management systems, we are taking the opportunity to bring you up to date on our progress, and ask your participation in the process.

At the October 3 CACC meeting, three sub-committees were established to gather information and make recommendations to the Commission on Technology concerning automated case management systems for possible implementation in Arizona. These sub-committees, made up of management, technologists and business experts from courts throughout the state, will provide valuable input to be used in determining our future case management system.

The tasks of the sub-committees are as follows:

- 1) Determine if there is a viable off the shelf solution for use in all Arizona courts.
- 2) If a solution exists, can one package work for all court types?
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To date, the Committee has conducted a viability study of some of the products that would lend themselves to the Limited Jurisdiction Court arena. As we further evaluate CMS (case management systems), your input and analysis is critical to automate the Arizona court systems. We are currently inviting vendors to present a 2-day demonstration at which the presence of your judges, clerk specialists, and case management personnel is vital, particularly at the General or Superior Court level.

We hope to schedule the vendor meetings in a timeframe that allows us to report our findings to the Commission on Technology at their January 9th 2004 meeting.
